

What are liquids, aerosols and gels?

The new rules apply to drinks, creams, perfumes, sprays, gels, toothpaste, lipstick, lip balm and similar substances.

Drinks, creams, perfumes, sprays, lipstick and similar substances purchased from duty free stores after security screening are not impacted by these rules.



Items Allowed

Any duty free items purchased after security at an Australian Airport.

Empty Containers

- Empty containers such as flasks or mugs

Cosmetics & Toiletries

- Sanitary towels and tampons
- Talcum powder
- Contact lenses and contact lens solution

Food

- Sandwiches
- Fruit
- Vegetables
- Other solid foods

Baby Products

- Empty containers such as empty bottles, beakers or flasks
- Baby milk
- Sterilised baby water
- Baby juice
- Baby products in liquid, gel or paste form
- Baby food powder

Medicines

- Essential prescribed medication
- Essential non-prescribed medication eg. cough syrup
- Insulin
- Medical devices



Items Over 100ml Not Allowed

Drinks*

- Any drinks in cans, bottles, plastic containers etc

Liquid Cosmetics & Toiletries*

All cosmetics and toiletries in liquid/gel form, for example:

- Fragrance and perfume
- Creams
- Liquid foundations and lip gloss
- Mascara
- Toothpaste
- All products in pressurised containers eg. hairspray and shaving foam/gel
- Deodorants

Food*

Any liquid-based food products in packets, tubes, plastic or tin containers, for example:

- Jams and syrups
- Sauces
- Pastes
- Yoghurts
- Soups (carton or otherwise)
- Stews or curry

*Please note that these items are allowed if purchased after security screening at an Australian Airport duty free store.

Simple Checklist

BEFORE CHECK-IN

Are your liquids, aerosols and gels 100ml or less?

- Liquids, aerosols and gels include items such as drinks, creams, perfumes, sprays, gels, toothpaste, lipstick, lip balm and similar substances.

CHECK-IN



If the items are greater than 100ml, place them in your check-in baggage

There are no new restrictions on what you can pack into your check-in baggage.

CARRY-ON

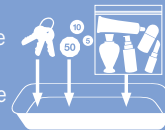


If you want to take items through the screening point make sure:

- Each item is 100ml or less
- All items fit in a transparent, one-litre bag
- The bag is sealed
- Only one bag per person is allowed.

SECURITY

- Proceed to the screening point
- Present this bag with your other carry-on baggage
- You may be also subject to a random frisk search. This is in addition to the explosive trace detection process already in place



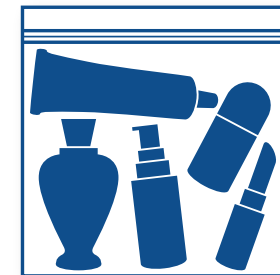

Under new security restrictions for liquids, aerosols and gels

The new Security Restrictions

To increase your safety, there are new rules about taking liquids, aerosols and gels on flights into and out of Australia.

These new rules are needed to protect you from the threat of liquid explosives.

Each container of liquids, aerosols or gels in your carry-on baggage must be 100 millilitres or less. They must all be sealed in a transparent, one-litre plastic bag. You are only allowed one bag. Any resealable bag of one litre capacity or less is allowed.

You may still carry through the screening point prescription medicines. Baby products and non-prescription medicines that you need for the flight are also allowed. Proof of need may be required.

When you get to the screening point, you will have to surrender any liquids, aerosols or gels greater than 100ml, including duty free bought outside the airport.

PURCHASES OF TAX AND DUTY FREE GOODS AFTER SECURITY SCREENING AT THE AIRPORT CAN BE TAKEN ON FLIGHTS AS CARRY-ON.

Purchases of Duty Free after security screening at Australian Airports are unaffected!



You can continue to buy duty free at the airport as normal.

You can choose your duty free in any airport duty free store and take it on your international flight. (Please see duty free staff if you are taking a connecting flight).



You can order your duty free in advance and have it 'Ready for Collection' at the airport.

Select your duty free in-store and have it 'Ready for Collection' when you return to Australia. Call 1800 733 000 or visit www.dutyfree.com.au and order your goods to be 'Ready for Collection' on departure or arrival.



You can buy duty free items on arrival back into Australia.

Purchasing duty free products in an Australian Airport Arrivals store limits the amount of baggage that you need to carry onboard your flight, and avoids the risk of confiscation.
